ANTEBELLUM CAPITAL OF GEORGIA



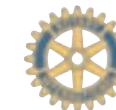

 Literacy Partnership Announced

We have exciting news! DG Dallas has announced the formation of a partnership between our District and The First Foundation for Childhood Literacy. Our District hopes to be joined by the other two Georgia Districts to carry this program across Georgia. It's a hallmark moment for Rotary. The First Foundation and Literacy in Georgia.

EVERYWHERE has been asked to take on a literacy project of some sort – and we're going to coordinate our club efforts across the District and across Georgia!

The project is called The Imagination Library – created by Dolly Parton as a way to get books into the hands of children as early as possible. The program was brought to Georgia by Robin Ferst Howser through the First Foundation for Childhood Literacy. It works like this: local committees are formed and work to register as many children under age 5 as they can find – through hospitals and doctors, day care centers, and at grocery stores – anywhere you find young children. Then every month until age 5 the child receives a hard-bound age-appropriate book in the mail (like "The Little Engine That Could") – to be their very own – up to 60 books in all! The idea is to encourage mom, dad or a friend to READ to that child!

This project isn't hard to carry out – it's a matter of forming a literacy committee – the committee can be from your club, or a joint committee with other clubs in your county or community, and you can include non-Rotarians on the committee (a great way to find future Rotarians). The committee's job is to find and register kids, provide local news to include in the newsletter written by the Foundation and to find local financial support. The First Foundation sends out the books – writes and sends the newsletter and parent tips. Your job is the easy part! The First Foundation has all the "how to" info you'll need – there are people to come and explain everything to your club and help you set up - you can get this up and running in a few weeks – it isn't very expensive - AND we even got some potential funding sources if you live in an area where funds are limited. Nervous about what you're getting into? Just create the committee and register 10 kids this year, or 5 (we don't care). Just see how easy it is.

MEMBER PROFILE
Mike Holmes



Mike Holmes is an Oklahoma native. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology from Northeastern State University, in Tahlequah, Oklahoma, and completed his Masters of Education degree in Junior College Teaching with an emphasis in Psychology from NSU, as well. He received his Ph.D. in Experimental/Cognitive Psychology from Oklahoma State University. While working on his masters, Mike was offered a teaching assistantship. After his first day of college teaching, he knew that he was hooked. Mike has 12 years of classroom teaching experience and has taught at Northeastern State University, North Arkansas Community College, Oklahoma State University, Doane College, and Villanova University.

During his time at Doane College, Mike became interested in a military career. He was commissioned into the U.S. Navy on July 6, 1986. Upon entering the Navy, Mike received aviation training in Pensacola, Florida, and was designated an Aerospace Experimental Psychologist. During his first two tours he primarily worked in the area of human factors engineering research and design on the F-14D Tomcat as well as on Anti-Submarine Warfare aircraft. In his next assignment as a department head, he led teams conducting research in the area of pilot selection and sustained military operations. Mike's next assignment was as Head, Operational Psychology Department, at the Naval Aerospace Medical Institute, where he managed the Aviation Selection Test Battery. He also served as the training officer for student Aerospace Experimental Psychologists and supported the training of Naval Flight Surgeons.

Mike next reported to the Naval Air Systems Command - Training Systems Division, where he managed both research and development (R&D) and acquisition programs for training systems. During this tour he received extensive program management training and experience and was certified as a level III (high) Program Manager. His next tour was as Deputy Director of the Joint Advanced Distributed Learning Co-Laboratory. In 2004, Captain Holmes reported to the U.S. Navy Human Performance Center as Head of the R&D Coordination Directorate and as Deputy for the Human Performance Technology Support and Development Directorate. Mike is a Certified Performance Technology (CPT). He retired from the U.S. Navy in the summer of 2007 after 21 years of active duty service.

Mike and his wife, Sally, have been married for 30 years and are the proud parents of one son and three daughters. (Mikayla is the only one left at home). They have a granddaughter and a grandson and are expecting twin grandsons. Mike was a charter member of the Avolon Park Rotary, Oklaado, Florida. He moved to Milledgeville in June 2007 to become the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Faculty at Georgia Military College.

Pacemakers keep hearts beating

In 1977, cardiologist Federico Alfaro returned to Guatemala from the United States after completing his education at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, Texas. A year later, a 17-year-old boy under his care died because his family couldn't afford a pacemaker, a battery-operated device that helps the heart beat in a regular rhythm.

"It made a big impact on me," said Alfaro, a member of the Rotary Club of Guatemala de la Asuncion. "It left a scar on my heart and as time went on, I realized the situation was the same, or worse, throughout the country."

Rotary is not a charitable organization, but it is built on those eternal principles that have served as the moral compass for people throughout the ages.

Today, Heartbeat International has 46 pacemaker distribution centers in 28 developing countries, says its president, Wil Mick, a member of the Rotary Club of USA. The system works like this: Local Tampa Downtown Daybreak, Florida, USA. The system works like this: Local International ships a free pacemaker to the center, and a doctor implants it. All medical services, which are frequently provided by Rotarian doctors, and lifetime follow-up are free.

Nearly 9,000 devices have been implanted (80 percent were pacemakers and the rest were defibrillators) in adults

Residents of Kenya need humanitarian aid following the 27 December election that sparked violence across the country. More than 650 people were killed, and more than 250,000 are displaced. Many of the displaced are staying in camps within the Rift Valley and Western Kenya, while others fled into neighboring Uganda and Tanzania. Immediate needs include blankets, cooking fuel, food, health care, mosquito nets, plastic sheeting, shelter, and water and sanitation. Because of continued violence in the streets, many people have been unable to buy food or go to work. It's anticipated that long-term recovery efforts will involve reconstruction of houses and buildings and the continued provision of food.
