A PEACEFUL DAY

The Rotary Club of Milledgeville
encouraged local residents to join us in
celebration during the annual World
Understanding and Peace Day ceremony
Thursday, February 25th.

Public Relations Laura Thompson
said she hoped the event would
encourage citizens to promote peace
locally and globally.

"Rotary International recognizes
each February as World Understanding
Month", said Thompson. "It is fitting
that we celebrate not only Rotary's
anniversary — [marking Feb. 23 as the
105th year] — but World
Understanding and Peace Day as well.
It is in the spirit of promoting global
peace and understanding that we gath-
er[ed] for this event."

Baldwin County became the first
Rotary Peace Community in the
United States in 1995. A 9,000-
pound, 17-foot-tall marble peace mon-
ument was erected outside the
Baldwin County Courthouse in 1996
— serving as a reminder to the com-
munity of the principles of peace and
equality that are core to the local
Rotary Club and those around the
globe.

The gathering took place at noon
in front of the Rotary Peace
Monument, located on Wilkinson
Street at the county courthouse where
the Georgia Military College band and
color guard performed.

Rotary District 6920 Gov. Clyde
Taylor presented remarks, and GMC
President Gen. Peter Boylan will be in
attendance as guest speaker.

"Gen. Boylan has been an active
member of the community. One of
his goals at GMC is duty, honor and
country," Milledgeville Rotary
President Dr. John Ferguson said.
"I've known him for years, and I fig-
ured this is the man of the hour [for
this year's event]."

Ferguson said he hopes locals will
gain a better understanding of the
local Rotary Club and learn the
importance of peace throughout the
community and world.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL NEWS

Rotarians work locally,
nationally, and internationally to
provide humanitarian service,
encourage high ethical standards
in all vocations, improve health
and sanitation, eradicate polio
and to promote peace through-
out the world. One of the many
ways the local Rotary Club of
Greene and Putnam Counties is
demonstrating the Rotary model
of "Service Above Self" is by
helping to provide Shelter Boxes
for those in need in Haiti. Over
\$2,000 has been raised by the
Rotary Club of Greene and
Putnam Counties to help the vic-
tims of the earthquake in Haiti.
"I am very pleased with the sup-
port and generosity of our mem-
bers to help those in Haiti. This
has been a true demonstration
of what Rotary is all about", says
Rotary President Buddy Watts.
The funds raised will be used
specifically to pay for two
Shelter Boxes.

Starting as the brainchild of
one Rotarian with the support of
his Rotary club in year 2000 -

ShelterBox has grown to
become the largest Rotary Club
project in the 100 year history
of the organization. Rotarian
support currently contributes an
estimated 50% of ShelterBox
donations. Around 5,000 rotary
clubs worldwide have supported
ShelterBox since it was
launched.

At the heart of every
ShelterBox is a ten-person tent
that is custom made to with-
stand extreme temperatures and
high winds. Vinyl insulated
sleeping mats and thermal blan-
kets, as well as other survival
equipment such as a wood
burning or multi fuel stove that
can burn anything from diesel to
old paint is included in a typical
ShelterBox; however the con-
tents of the boxes are adapted
to a specific disaster, in order to
provide those in need with the
items most urgently needed.
Additionally, a children's pack
including crayons, books, and
pens is intended to bring smiles
to children's faces. The box

itself is lightweight and versatile,
sometimes being used as stor-
age place for water or food or
even a cot to sleep. Over 2500
ShelterBoxes are already in
Haiti, with several more thou-
sand on the way. The cost of a
ShelterBox is \$1,000 including
all materials, packing, storage
and distribution to individual
recipients worldwide.

The Rotary Club of Greene
and Putnam County is one of
many Rotary Clubs worldwide
that are raising funds to help
provide and distribute life-sav-
ing tents. "Our club is involved
in supporting over 25 local
projects including First Call
Pregnancy Center, Ferst
Foundation for Childhood
Literacy, and our Rotary Club's
Second Harvest Food
RescueProgram. What many
may not be aware of is our
involvement in several interna-
tional projects such as Alliance
for Smiles, and this ShelterBox
Relief for Haiti to name a few",
says President Watts.
