## CLUB NEWS

### Historic moments — Rotary mottoes

Rotary's official mottoes, "Service Above Self" and "They Profit Most Who Serve Best", trace back to the early days of the organization.

In 1911, "He Profits Most Who Serves Best" was approved as the Rotary motto at the second convention of the National Association of Rotary Clubs of America, in Portland, Oregon. It was adapted from a speech made by Rotarian Arthur Frederick Sheldon to the first convention, held in Chicago the previous year. Sheldon declared that "only the science of right conduct toward others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."

The Portland convention also inspired the motto "Service Above Self". During a convention outing on the Columbia River, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, talked with Seattle Rotarian J.E. Pinkham about the proper way to organize a Rotary club, offering the principle his club had adopted: "Service, Not Self." Pinkham invited Paul P. Harris, who also was on the boat trip, to join their conversation. Harris asked Collins to address the convention, and the phrase "Service, Not Self" was met with great enthusiasm.

At the 1950 RI Convention in Detroit, slightly modified versions of the two slogans were formally approved as the official mottoes of Rotary: "He Profits Most Who Serves Best" and "Service Above Self". The 1989 Council on Legislation established Service Above Self as the principal motto of Rotary, because it best conveys the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service. "He Profits Most Who Serves Best" was modified by the 2004 Council to its current wording, "They Profit Most Who Serve Best."

## MEMBER PROFILE

### Robert "Bob" Haney



Bob Haney is a native Georgian who graduated from Mercer University and the University of Kentucky. During the last years of his graduate study, he taught at Miami University (Ohio) and Georgetown

College (Kentucky). After traveling in Spain in the spring of 1982 he entered the job market and accepted a position at Georgia Southern University where he would spend the next 22 years in a series of administrative jobs, culminating in the position of Associate Provost. Bob says that of all the great experiences there, he looks back with nostalgia on the eight years that the university was growing at approximately 1,000 students per year: "It was challenging to meet the demand for courses, but it was energizing to be involved in the fastest-growing college in the U.S. at that time. There was a great feeling of optimism and of progress toward excellence," Bob says.

Four years ago, Bob felt that it was time to look for new challenges on the job and to learn new skills. In July 2004 he was named Executive Assistant to the President and Chief of Staff at Georgia College & State University. This July, he became Interim Vice President for Academic Affairs. He serves on the President's Executive Council, the President's Administrative Leadership Council, and the Executive Committee of the University Senate. He thinks Georgia College & State University is an institution of boundless potential, one that will achieve national distinction in his lifetime. Statewide, he is a member of the University System's Council on General Education.

Bob enjoys Rotary and served as program chair in 2006-07, a post he describes as a great way to meet community leaders in a variety of fields. He thanks his sponsor, Faye Gilbert, who invited him to Rotary during his first week in Milledgeville, and Fred Van Horn, president during the year he was inducted, for their inspiring record of service to others. "Our Club has a rich history of service to our community and region; we should all be inspired to continue the good work of Rotary here," according to Bob.

### PhRMA's US\$100,000 gift benefits Rotary's challenge

To help support Rotary's top goal of eradicating polio worldwide, the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America, known as PhRMA, has donated US\$100,000 to The Rotary Foundation. The gift will help meet Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge.

PhRMA is an industry trade group that represents the leading pharmaceutical research and biotechnology companies in the United States, including sanofi-aventis and Novartis, two of the primary distributors of the oral polio vaccine.

"Our relationship with Rotary is very much part of our efforts to advance innovative and responsible approaches to providing access to sustainable health care," said Chris Ward, PhRMA's deputy vice president for international alliance development. "Our industry is driven by the search for cures and a genuine desire to improve health outcomes all over the world."

When looking at the advancement of this goal, there is no better example than Rotary's work in ridding the world of polio, said Ward.

### Rotaractors go all out in fight against polio in Pakistan

Six Rotaract clubs, 69 Rotaractors, and 687 hours of work over five days added up to a big victory for thousands of children in Karachi, Pakistan. The Rotaractors, joined by other volunteers, helped immunize 4,276 children under age five against polio in the city's densely populated Kemari Town.

The Rotaract-led effort took place during Pakistan's Subnational Immunization Days (SNIDs) from 1 to 4 July. Teams of Rotaractors and volunteers went from house to house giving children drops of vaccine, marking the fingers of those immunized, chalking the doors of houses to indicate families covered, and recording information on tally sheets.
