ROTARY INTERNATIONAL NEWS

Action group fights AIDS year-round

A decade after she lost her son, Jerry, to AIDS, Marion Bunch's life took an unexpected detour.

In 2003, she started what's now Rotarians for Fighting AIDS, a Rotarian Action Group, parlaying her skills as a sales executive and leveraging the power of Rotary to educate at-risk children about making good choices.

Early on, Bunch, a member of the Rotary Club of Dunwoody, Georgia, USA, realized the potential of partnerships and signed on Coca-Cola, as well as the international charity HOPE Worldwide and the U.S. government, as key players in the action group.

"You can't fight this alone," she says.

As people around the globe observe World AIDS Day, 1 December, the group is continuing its work for a future free of HIV/AIDS. It recently joined the Partnership for an HIV-Free Generation, a U.S. government-coordinated coalition working to stem the spread of the disease among young people in sub-Saharan Africa.

"World AIDS Day gives us an opportunity to show Rotarians who have so generously supported us what we are able to accomplish," says Anne Dillard Glenn, the group's director of marketing and communications. "The AIDS pandemic is killing entire populations and leaving 12 million orphaned children. We are reaching thousands, but it's a drop in the bucket."

DEFINITION OF ROTARY

Rotary is an organization of business and professional leaders united worldwide, who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and help build goodwill and peace in the world. There are approximately 1.2 million Rotarians, members of 31,936 Rotary clubs in 166 countries. Rotary is not a political organization, but all Rotarians are vitally concerned with everything pertaining to good citizenship and the election of good men and women to public office. Rotary is not a charitable organization, yet its activities exemplify the charity and the sacrifices that one should expect from people who believe that they have a responsibility to help others. Rotary is not a religious organization, but it is built on those eternal principles that have served as the moral compass for people throughout the ages.

OBJECT OF ROTARY

The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise through the development of acquaintance as the opportunity for service, the promotion of high ethical standards in business and professions, through service in one's personal, business, and community life, and the advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace.

- Fostering unity among member clubs;
- Strengthening and expanding Rotary around the world;
